It is a great honour to hold Noriko Tosaka's special performance of "A Thousand Cranes". It is based on the true story of a 12 year old girl, Sadako, who was exposed to the first use of nuclear weapons in human history on August 6th, 1945 in Hiroshima in Japan. Diagnosed with leukemia as a result of the blast, she sadly succumbed to it 8 months after being informed of her illness.

Believing that folding a thousand cranes would cure her, Sadako continued to fold cranes from medicine wrappers and other materials until her death. Her story is widely passed down not only in Japan but also abroad, and a statue of Sadako has been erected at the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park. Through this event, I hope that the people of Orkney and Japan can be brought that ever bit closer, and that the story gives us an opportunity to think about the nature of war and peace.

When Sadako began her journey, she was just an ordinary girl with ordinary dreams for the future. When war brought Sadako a future she did not expect, she made a wish. Her wish was not for herself only; she spoke for children all over the world. This is why the Orkney Japan Association's project is an excellent endeavour that perfectly honours Sadako's memory. It brings elegant Japanese culture to the beautiful and proud Scottish Islands, joining hands across the globe. Noriko Tosaka has devoted much of her career to this play, A Thousand Cranes, and Sadako's message. It seems to me that Noriko is much like Sadako herself.
